ADDRESSING AND PREVENTING GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE AND MENTAL TRAUMA

- ◆ To mark 16 Days of Activism against GBV, UNFPA supported events in 60 cities and communities in Ukraine and launched an [educational online game](#). These activities raised awareness, predominantly among women and young people, about violence and the services available for survivors and those at risk of violence. As a result of the events, the key message - “Sensitivity Overcomes Violence” - was heard across Ukraine, including in areas that recently came back under the control of the Government of Ukraine (Kherson) and those not under government control. In addition, communities of displaced people from Melitopol, Mariupol and Severodonetsk held events in parts of the country where many internally displaced people are currently staying.
- ◆ Since July, more than 5,369 people have received psychosocial support and information in four survivor relief centres in Kyiv, Lviv, Dnipro and Zaporizhzhia.
- ◆ 27 facilities for survivors of GBV, including shelters, crisis rooms, counselling centres, the national hotline and 101 mobile psychosocial support teams provide a wide range of assistance to survivors and women at risk of violence. Since the start of the war, over 9,596 people have received psychosocial help from the mobile teams, around 43,000 people have received information on GBV risk mitigation (around 86 per cent women) and over 27,000 people (around 78 per cent women) have been consulted via the national hotline.

ADDRESSING AND PREVENTING GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE AND MENTAL TRAUMA

- ◆ Since March, UNFPA has opened five offline VONA (in Ukrainian “SHE”) hubs and supported a [national platform](#) to provide career advice and psychological support to vulnerable women who have faced displacement and/or violence. Over 3,240 women have received career consultations and support since the hubs were opened. Last week, UNFPA Honorary Ambassador, Maria Efrosinina, [visited the hub](#) in Kyiv.
- ◆ On 29 November, a mission to Zhytomyr enabled the U.S. Ambassador to Ukraine, H.E Bridget Brink, and USAID Head of Mission, Mr. James Hope, to talk to GBV service providers and the local authorities. USAID supports UNFPA’s humanitarian work in 30 cities and communities across Ukraine. In addition, sixty mobile psychosocial support teams continue to assist women and girls across Ukraine, including in areas badly affected by the war.
- ◆ Thanks to Avon Ukraine, UNFPA has launched a crisis room for GBV survivors that will serve the needs of the women and girls of Chernihiv region.

ENSURING SAFE BIRTH, REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND THE RESILIENCE OF YOUNG PEOPLE

- ◆ In the past week, a UNFPA-supported mobile maternity unit started operating in the region of Kharkiv. Over 230 women have already received access to life-saving SRH services, including qualified medical assistance at birth and post-natal care.
- ◆ Nine inclusive medical examination rooms were opened in Poltava, Dnipro, Drohobych, Chervonohrad, Mukachevo and Vinnytsia. These surgeries provide access to reproductive health-care assistance, are fully equipped for regular gynaecological examinations and are accessible for women living with disabilities.
- ◆ UNFPA launched a national SRH hotline to refer displaced women to local health-care facilities, including UNFPA-supported mobile clinics, and can provide peer-to-peer consultations with a general practitioner when the patient has severe health issues.
- ◆ Since April, seven UNFPA mobile SRH clinics have provided medical assistance to 11,354 people in the regions of Kyiv, Lviv, Vinnytsia, Poltava, Cherkasy, Kharkiv and Mykolaiv.
- ◆ From 7 to 9 November, a joint mission with the Embassy of Norway visited Poltava, Kharkiv, Izium and Balakliya to meet partners delivering sexual and reproductive health services in Kharkiv perinatal hospital, Poltava perinatal hospital and in areas that recently came back under the control of the Government of Ukraine. Mobile teams, including a mobile maternity unit, working in these areas ensure that women have access to life-saving reproductive health services.
- ◆ On 30 November, UNFPA, the Ambassador of Spain, H.E. Ricardo López-Aranda Jagu, and the Mayor of Odesa, Mr. Gennadiy Trukhanov, visited Maternity hospital #5, one of the 51 maternity hospitals in Ukraine that have received inter-agency SRH kits sustaining the provision of reproductive health services. The delegation also talked to the SRH mobile unit assigned to the region’s perinatal centre, which provides outreach services in areas with a higher concentration of IDPs in the Odesa region.
- ◆ 178 specialists from non-governmental organizations in 14 regions attended workshops on the clinical management of rape. The workshops concentrated on the kind of care and treatment available to survivors of rape and provided an overview of the different steps involved in caring for survivors.
- ◆ To fill the critical gap in medical supplies and equipment, 104 tons of inter-agency reproductive health kits have been delivered to 51 hospitals with perinatal centres in 22 regions since the start of the war. During the week after Kherson came back under the control of the Government of Ukraine, 2.4 tons of inter-agency reproductive health kits were delivered to two maternity hospitals in the city.
- 1,560 young people enrolled in an educational course on youth resilience aimed at equipping young people with the skills needed to face adversity, trauma, threats, or significant sources of stress, as well as cope with the devastating effects of war.

⇒ INTER-AGENCY COORDINATION

GBV Sub-Cluster (GBV SC)

- ◆ In November 2022, the first regional coordination meetings to discuss the humanitarian GBV response were held in the regions of Volyn, Dnipro, Chernihiv, Vinnytsia, Kherson, Ivano-Frankivsk, Cherkasy, Odesa, Zhytomyr, Chernivtsi and Zakarpattia. The meetings were organized in close cooperation with regional authorities responsible for coordinating the GBV response in their areas. Social protection and family policy departments, social services, police, health-care departments, representatives of territorial communities, international and local NGOs engaged in GBV response and representatives of the protection and health clusters participated in the meetings.
- ◆ A thematic coordination meeting on Women and Girls Safe Spaces (WGSS) was held to ensure partners work together, avoid duplication and strengthen collaboration on WGSS at the local level in accordance with the minimum standards of inter-agency GBV response in emergencies.
- ◆ During the GBV safety audit coordination meeting, standards and tools for safety audits were agreed upon. The GBV SC partners endorsed the tools for use by GBV and non-GBV humanitarian actors in Ukraine.
- ◆ Twelve active regional working groups coordinate the humanitarian response to GBV in Ukraine. These groups hold regular meetings in all regions of Ukraine to ensure communication between state and non-state actors working on the response to GBV remains strong. The aim is to guarantee referral pathways for GBV cases and to provide quality, effective and accessible services to GBV survivors.

SRH Technical Working Group (SRMCH TWG)

- ◆ UNFPA continues to chair the SRH TWG coordination meetings. On November 28, a workshop was held to share information on the clinical management of rape. Twenty-six participants from nine agencies, including the Ministry of Health, MHPSS, HIV, the GBV SC and the health cluster, were in attendance. During the workshop, the mapping of services (including post-exposure prophylaxis for HIV (PEP) and essential medications) was completed and training data was collected. In addition, partners agreed upon a strategy to streamline the provision of quality services and ensure standardized training.

UNFPA UKRAINE FUNDING STATUS (AS OF 30 NOVEMBER)

- ◆ In March 2022, UNFPA launched its emergency appeal. To align with the revised United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) appeal and based on continuing needs, as of October UNFPA Ukraine has decided to increase its funding requirement to US\$57.75 million for life-saving reproductive health and gender-based violence interventions to address the needs of women and girls in Ukraine. There is an urgent requirement for sexual and reproductive health services and more funding is needed.
- ◆ As of 30 November, the UNFPA Appeal for Ukraine was 70 per cent funded thanks to USAID's Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance (BHA), Australia, the United Kingdom, Denmark, CERF, Canada, Spain, Netherlands, the EU (DG-ECHO, DG-NEAR), Norway, Ireland, OCHA-Ukraine Humanitarian Fund, Sweden, Iceland, Estonia and the UN Partnership to Promote the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNPRPD).
- UNFPA is also grateful to our donors for contributing to the essential core resources that ensure programmes are delivered in a predictable and sustainable manner.
